Such project can disrupt life, destroy the fauna and flora, prompt displacement, etc. Also, the ACHPR adopted Resolution ACHPR/Res.551 (LXXIV) 2023 on a Human Rights-Based approach to the Implementation and Monitoring of the African Continental Free Trade Area Agreement. 	Displacement and migration prompted by conflicts, climate change and environmental degradation expose affected individuals and communities to high levels of risk. They erode fragile livelihoods and ecosystems, aggravate existing vulnerabilities and undermine resilience. This hinders many of the Charter-protected human rights and SDGs goals including ending poverty (goal 1), ending hunger (goal 2) and good health and well-being (goal 3). The panel reflects on averting, mitigating and responding to conflict, climate and development induced migration. The panel will also address the structural causes of conflicts and how human rights can address these.
